ENGCMP 0200—*Seminar in Composition*

An undergraduate seminar that focuses on student inquiry and exploration in writing, reading, and discussion. The seminar encourages students' thoughtful engagement with various topics, including current events, patterns of thought in the social forum, and ethnography. **4 sections**

COMM 201—*Human Communication in a Technological Age*

An undergraduate course that applies a media ecology perspective to guide students toward a better understanding of technologically mediated environments and their impact on the human condition. (*A distance education course co-taught with Dr. Calvin L. Troup.*) **1 section**

ENGL 1539—*Fundamentals of College Writing*

Focuses on intermediate writing concerns to help students strengthen college-level essay development, organization, and presentation. **3 sections**

Expands students' knowledge of expository writing, audience awareness, and MLA Style conventions. Includes a focus on Literacy Narrative, Comparative Analysis, and Rhetorical Analysis writing. Emphasizes MLA Style conventions. **23 sections**

ENGL 1550C—*Writing I with Corequisite*

Offers an additional semester hour of individualized instruction to support students who demonstrate need for supplemental instruction beyond the traditional Writing I course offering. **3 sections**

ENGL 1550 (DE)—*Writing I (Distance Education, Online)*

Integrates various online learning platforms, including Blackboard Learn, Connect from McGraw-Hill, and Tegrity lecture recording, for implementation of course materials. Includes a focus on Literacy Narrative, Comparative Analysis, and Rhetorical Analysis writing. Emphasizes MLA Style conventions. **1 section**

ENGL 1550H—*Honors Writing I*

Follows an accelerated approach to academic writing. Includes a focus on Literacy Narrative, Comparative Analysis, and Rhetorical Analysis writing. Emphasizes MLA Style conventions. **1 section**

ENGL 1551—*Writing II*

Emphasizes research practices through the application of rhetorical coordinates and requires implementation of APA style conventions. **19 sections**

ENGL 1551H—*Honors Writing II*

Follows an accelerated approach to research and argumentation for students qualifying for honors credit. Students explore higher order academic writing conventions and presentation methods. Emphasizes APA Style conventions. **1 section**

ENGL 1551H (DE)—*Honors Writing II (Distance Education, Online)*

Integrates various online learning platforms, including Blackboard Learn, Connect from McGraw-Hill, and “Tegrity” lecture recording, for implementation of course materials.
